Reforestation of Sylvia Lake

The Sylvia Lake's watershed has lost hundred's perhaps thousands of trees over the last 10 plus years. microburst, ice storm, pests, logging, power lines, and property owner's constructions projects have taken their toll on the forests.

It is time to think about replanting.

220 trees have been ordered from the SLC Soil and Water Conservation District. Most have been purchased for less than \$1.00 per tree. We are hoping to sell them for at cost plus a small planting fee. Lea Dickson has agreed to serve as the tree farmer while the program gets organized.

Species ordered: White Pine, Scotch Pine, Balsam Fir, Tamarack. Sugar Maple, Red Maple, Native Birch, Black Cherry, Burr Oak, White Ash, Black Walnut, Hybrid Poplar, Purple Lilac, and Juneberry. 10 of each species except for 50 each of the Birch and Sugar Maple. Lea will pick them up on April 28th at the Cornell Ext. Office in Canton.

State Officials Warn Against Feeding Water Fowl

They gather at ponds and streams throughout the north country. It can seem natural to want a closer look. But when you give ducks food, the state says you're feeding a larger problem.

"It's been our long standing practice to advise people against feeding waterfowl," said Stephen Litwhiler of the New York State Department of Environmental Conservation. According to Litwhiler, when large numbers of ducks and gulls are in unnatural areas, it can be harmful to the health of the birds.

Officials say bird flu doesn't seem to be an imminent threat right now, but Litwhiler says that doesn't mean people should ignore the precautions. "People continually enjoy waterfowl. Bird watchers like to go out with their binoculars, watch them at a distance and encourage people to enjoy wildlife in their natural surroundings," said Litwhiler.

Distance is the key word from the state's perspective. While some towns have laws against feeding ducks, New York state does not. "May we see a regulation in the future about the feeding of waterfowl? That's a possibility," Litwhiler said. Even without a law, Litwhiler says the state is preparing for the best way to keep residents informed if bird flu hits the U.S.

"We are discussing at a state-wide level the best avenues to follow and education is education is currently one of these things they are discussing," said Litwhiler.

EMERGENCY

Call 911. Don't forget to post your 911 address in a prominent location on your property and camp. Call the 911 operator from your camp phone to verify the directions to your place.



NEW YORK STATE BOATING RULES OF THE ROAD

A PWC is subject to all the laws that motor boat operators must follow, as well as:

- You may not ride within 500 feet of a marked swim area except when going directly to or from a launch site. Speed is restricted to 10 MPH.
- In New York State, speed is limited to 5 MPH when within 100 feet of the shore, a dock, pier, raft, float, or an anchored or moored boat.
- You may not ride between sunset and sunrise and times of restricted visibility.
- Weaving in and out of traffic, jumping boat wakes, splashing others is dangerous and illegal.
- You must carry your boating safety certificate on board.
- One life saving device for each person aboard.
- Use lights after dusk
- Be wise and carry an extra line, paddle and anchor.



SWIMMING- Swim with a buddy, have a boat with you when swimming any long distance. Look before leaping.

SUBMERGED ROCKS AND DEBRIS- Be aware of their locations. Water level changes, storms and ice break-up create new hazards every year. Some hazards may not be marked.

AVOID GAS AND OIL SPILLAGE- Check your motor for leaks. Fill-up the tank away from the water.

CAMP ROADS

Use slow speed (5 mph is recommended) Please be courteous, ATV riders please use good judgement and avoid roads where you may be considered a nuisance. If you think violations have occurred, identify the violator and call the sheriff or state troopers. Call parent when appropriate. Please remind family and guests to not use the woods to discard bottles, cans and garbage. Be a good neighbor and keep the woods beautiful.

PET OWNERS

The Town of Fowler has a Leash and Nuisance Law. In summary, dogs may not run at large, bark habitually, or chase or intimidate any person. complaints may be filed with a peace officer, Town Justice or Dog Warden.

Septic System Maintenance

Beautiful Sylvia Shoreline Management Recommendations and Reminders

*Edited from the Wisconsin Waterfront
Management practices checklist.*

1. Leave or maintain a buffer zone of natural vegetation.
2. Consider preserving or re-creating a natural, wooded setting.
3. Ensure that you have appropriate stormwater and erosion controls.
4. Consider smaller lawns with shrub borders or native plantings to replace the lawn area.
5. Choose grass and/or ground cover that minimizes maintenance, fertilizer and pesticide application.
6. Construct docks, decks, and other outdoor structures from sustainable, low-toxicity materials such as ACQ treated wood or recycled plastic composite materials (no CCA-Chromated Copper Arsenate-treated lumber).
7. Maintain the existing elevation of the lot so as to not significantly change the flow of water from the land.
8. Use no- or low-phosphorus detergents and use soaps and other cleaning agents carefully — never allow them to wash into a lake, stream or wetland.
9. Pick up and dispose of pet waste immediately, properly and away from the water.
10. Maintain sewage systems.
11. Keep garden and grass clippings and leaves out of the water.

We will have a detailed program on septic systems at the June 9 Spring Meeting, Fowler Town Hall, 7:00 PM. Jim Yaeger, from Witherbee & Whalen, Inc. (septic tank manufacturers) will present options for waste water systems and recommendations for lake front property. The county health department will be providing us with material for system maintenance and we also hope to have Myrna Barney, SLC Public Health Sanitarian, on hand to answer specific questions.

David Lockwood, Sylvia Lake Association Sanitation Chair, has been reviewing Fowler septic system codes and we hope to meet with the code enforcement officer to review local regulations. If you are planning a building project, the SLA board encourages you to assess your current waste water system to ensure that it can handle new showers, dishwashers etc. Untreated sewage contains disease-causing bacteria and viruses, as well as unhealthy amounts of nitrate and other chemicals. Failed septic systems can allow untreated sewage to seep into wells, groundwater, and Sylvia's surface water.

A few reminders;

- If you are having a large crowd or family reunion, consider renting portable toilets.
- Conserve water to reduce amount of wastewater disposed of by your system. Do laundry over several days. Do not use separate pipes to a side ditch. The gray water contains germs and can wind its way to the lake or seep into the groundwater.
- Have your septic tank regularly inspected.
- Call your county health department when you experience problems or if there are any signs of failure.
- Keep detailed records.
- Don't use septic tank additives. They can cause your drainfields to clog.
- Limit the use of garbage disposals.
- Don't plant anything over the drainfield with an extensive root system.
- Don't drive over you tank and drainfield

David and Myrna remind us that pumping your system is probably the single most important thing you can do to protect your system. If the buildup of solids in the tank becomes too high and solids move to the drainfield, this could clog and strain the system to the point where a new drainfield will be needed.

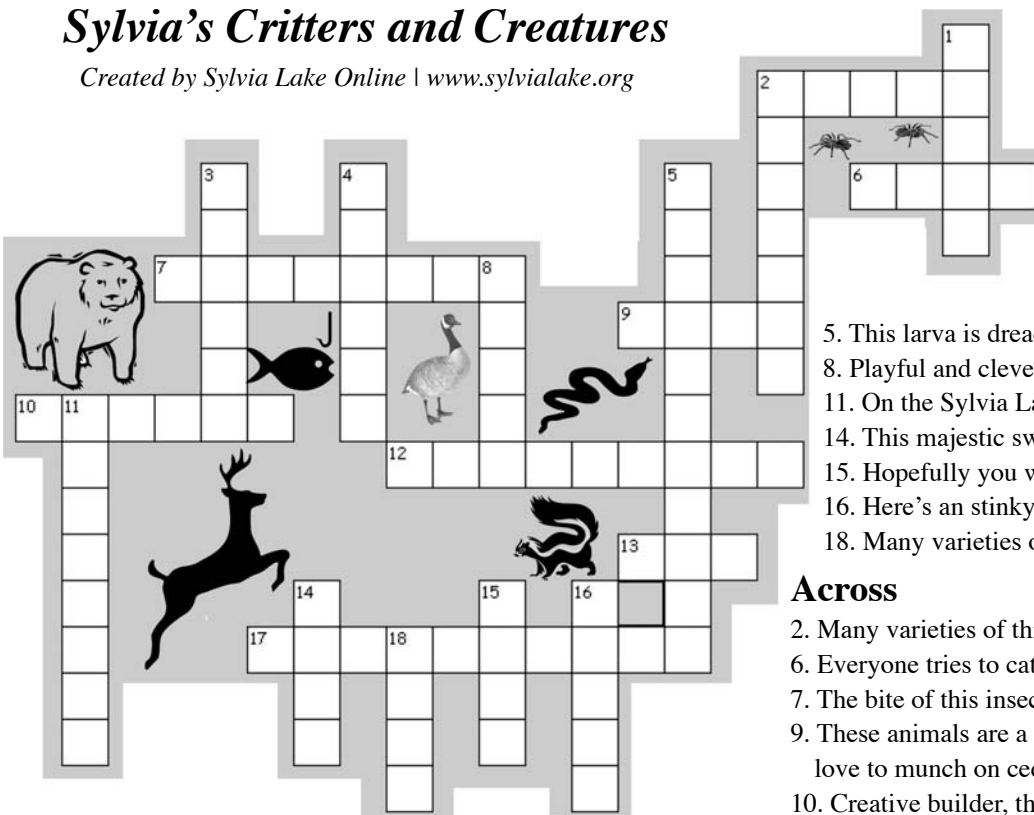
